- Home care visits by Geriatrics Department for all elderly and aged population at Mysuru at affordable cost and with free transport facilities.
- JSS Urban Health Centre situated at Medar's block, Bamboo bazar, Mysuru and rural health training centre situated at Suttur are providing much-needed medical care to the people in urban slums and rural communities.
- Apart from this JSS Medical College, has joined hands with government of Karnataka in providing health care to the people in rural areas by adapting primary health centres.
- JSS Medical college encourages medical students to donate supplies / stationaries/learning resources to the kids in Anganwadi centres and primary schools as a social responsibility under medical students' social responsibility initiative.
- Employees of JSS Medical College extend help to the poor through Poor Patient's Fund and elderly fund.

To help the needy and poor, JSS Medical College conducts


- a. Regular health education programmes on prevention and control of common ailments



On Oral Cancer Awareness Month, SIG on "Oral Precancer & Cancer" organized Multiple events throughout the month. 





The students are trained in the various concepts of management and the theories informing the practices. 

Teaching & Hospital postings being an integral component of curriculum helps students Learning to get a real exposure to health care delivery systems. Students have the benefit of hands-on-experiential learning by solving real-time problems and issues in healthcare facilities. The department also organizes visits to various hospitals and industries for enhanced hands-on learning about the advancements in their respective areas. Department of Health System Management Studies have undertaken **Activities** related to several initiatives and worked towards addressing 'No Poverty'. Few of the the goal initiatives included conducting entrepreneurship development workshop to facilitate start-up's, personality development and resume writing workshops to make the students job ready for corporate organizations, internship, and placement initiatives. **Entrepreneurship development program** Three-day Entrepreneurship Development Program (EDP), for two distinct

Three-day Entrepreneurship Development Program (EDP), for two distinct batches of students of III semester of MBA (Hospital Administration), MBA (Pharmacy Administration), MSc (Nutrition & Dietetics) and MBA (Information Technology) was conducted from 2nd to 4 th December 2024 and 5th to 7th December 2024 respectively at SPARKLE CINE, Centre of Excellence in Entrepreneurship Development (CEED) in collaboration with the Department of Health System Management Studies of JSS Academy of Higher Education & Research, Mysuru. A total of 104 students participated from the two batches. The importance of entrepreneurship in present-day

education cannot be overstated. In an era where innovation drives personal and national progress, cultivating an entrepreneurial mindset among students in higher education systems, is crucial and determines the outcome of educational institutions in preparing Job Providers rather than being a factory producing mere Job Seekers. The uniqueness of this program lies in the approach to fostering entrepreneurial spirit among students through hands-on, interactive sessions led by real-life entrepreneurs who engaged students in a dynamic learning model, guiding them in identifying societal problem statements and leveraging their formal education to innovate and develop product prototypes. This program aimed to instill within students the attributes necessary for entrepreneurial success. A key highlight of the program was the encouragement for students to create business model canvases for their innovations based on identifies problem statements. This not only allowed them to conceptualize their ideas thoroughly but also provided a platform for them to exhibit their soft skills in professional communication. The students were given the invaluable opportunity to pitch their startup prototypes, honing their ability to articulate ideas effectively and persuasively. 50 This hands-on, team-driven, and participative teaching methodology served as one of the effective modern education practices as the program not only immersed students in real-life challenges but also empowered them to apply theoretical knowledge in practical scenarios. Such an approach not only fosters innovation but also prepares students for the dynamic and competitive landscape of the professional world providing students with an education that goes beyond textbooks.







Personality Development Workshop

Soft skills are essential for personal and interpersonal abilities that shape how individuals communicate, collaborate, and adapt in various environments. They include communication, teamwork, problem-solving, and emotional intelligence, "each of which plays "a crucial role both in professional and personal success. As workplaces continue to advance,
